## IMPORT HEALTH REQUIREMENTS OF INDONESIA FOR SLAUGHTER CATTLE EXPORTED FROM THE UNITED STATES

The animals must be accompanied by a U.S. Origin Health Certificate (VS Form 17-140) issued by a veterinarian authorized by the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) and endorsed by a Veterinary Services (VS) veterinarian. The certificate shall contain the name and address of both the consignor and the consignee and the complete identification of the animals to be exported. Additional information shall include:

### CERTIFICATION STATEMENTS

1. The United States is free of contagious bovine pleuropneumonia, rinderpest, and foot-and-mouth disease.
2. The animals have been born and raised in the United States.
3. The individual animals are free from clinical evidence of bluetongue, leukosis, Johne's disease, and other reportable diseases of bovines.

### TEST REQUIREMENTS

The animals were negative to the following tests:

1. Tuberculosis - intradermal caudal fold test using bovine PPD tuberculin within 60 days prior to export.
2. Brucellosis - standard tube or standard plate test at 1:50 dilution (less than 30 IU) within 30 days prior to export. Test not required for steers or spayed heifers.

### OTHER INFORMATION

Upon arrival in Indonesia, the animals will be transported directly from the airport to the slaughter establishments where they must be slaughtered within 3 days after arrival.

### EMBARKATION CERTIFICATION

At the port of embarkation, a VS port veterinarian shall attach to the U.S. Origin Health Certificate, the Certificate of Inspection of Export Animals (VS Form 17-37) showing:

1. The name and address of the consignor.
2. The name and address of the consignee.

3. The number and species of animals to be shipped.
4. A statement that the animals have been given a careful veterinary inspection at the port of embarkation and found free from evidence of communicable disease and exposure thereto within 24 hours of exportation.
