- Adams, Gerald Dobree. Winged thunderbolt' the story of a peregrine falcon. London, Constable, 1954. (SK 321 A21)
Story of a Tiercel; his hatching, growing up, learning to fly and prey.
- Barber, Robert Heberden. A supplementary bibliography of hawking, being a catalogue of books published in England between 1891 and 1943 together with criticism, to which is added a list of the most important books published prior to that period. London, Fielding, 1943. (SK 321 B23)
- Belany, James Cockburn. A treatise upon falconry.* Berwick-upon-Tweed, 1841. (SK 321 B42)
A brief outline of the character and habits of the different hawks principally used in British hawking, with proper instructions for keeping, training, and flying the birds.
- Berners, Juliana. The boke of Saint Albans.* London, E. Stock, 1881. (SK 321 B52)
Reproduced in facsimile from the original printed in 1486. Contains treatises on hawking., hunting, and cote armour.
- Bert, Edmund. Treatise on hawks and hawking.* London, B. Quaritch, 1891. (SK 321)
Reprinted from the original of 1619. Still considered of practical value to the falconer.
- Brodrick, William. Falconers' favorites.* London, Taylor & Francie, 1865. (SK 321 B86)
Consists of six large, beautifully colored plates with descriptive text.

- Cerely, Stanley. The gyr falcon adventure.
London, Collins, 1955. (SK 321 C41)
Observing and photographing wildlife,
especially falcons, in Iceland.
- Cox, Harding Edward de Fonblanque. Coursing and
falconry. London, Longmans, Green, 1892.
(SK 321 C87)
Written by a past-master in the art of
handling all hawks, but especially the
passage peregrine.
- Craighead, Frank Cooper. Hawks in the hand;
adventures in photography and falconry.
Boston, Houghton Mifflin, 1939. (SK 321 C88)
Describes the adventures of two American
boys who make a hobby of training and
photographing hawks.
- Fleming, John Arnold. Falconry and falcons.
London, Country Life, 1934. (SK 321 F59)
An account of the hawk and its training for
sport, with some excellent photographs of
the birds in natural settings.
- Freeman, Gage Earle. Practical falconry; to
which is added, How I became a falconer.*
London, Horace Cox, 1869. (SK 321 F85)
A practical text on the care of the birds
and their use in hunting.
- Freeman, Gage Earle. Falconry, its claims,
history and practice.* London, Longmans,
Green, 1859. (SK 321 F85f)
A rare book by practical falconers.
- Friedrich II, Emperor of Germany. The art of
falconry. Boston, Branford, 1955. (SK 321 F91)

A reprint of Wood's translation of De arte venandi cum avibus. The complete six books of an important medieval treatise

Harting, James Edmund. Hints on the management of hawks.* London, Cox, 1884. (SK 321 H32)

A rare and excellent manual; with twelve maxims for falconers.

Hausman, Leon Augustus. Birds of prey of northeastern North America. New Brunswick, N. J., Rutgers University Press, 1948. (QL696 .A2 H37)

A description of the various species found in the area. Includes falcons and hawks,

Heatherley, Francis. The peregrine falcon at the eyrie.* New York, Scribner's, 1913.

The natural history of the wild peregrine, with many good photographs.

Illingworth, Frank. Falcons and falconry.

London, Blandford, 1946. (SK 321 12)

The author's experiences and methods in quest of the gyr-falcons in their cliff-face eyries.

Latham, Simon. Latham's falconry, or the falcons lure and cure.* London, Jackson, 1618.

A very rare and valuable work.

May, John Richard. The hawks of North America; their field identification and feeding habits.

New York, National Association of Audubon Societies, 1935. (QL696 .A2 M46)

Many colored illustrations and excellent descriptions, listing areas where each is found.

Cambridge, England, The author, 1949.

A compilation of a series of four articles
written for the beginner,
- Michell, Edward Blair. The art and practice of
hawking.* London, Methuen, 1900. (SK 321 M62)
Thought to be one of the best texts in any
Language.
- A perfect booke for kepinge of sparhawkes or
groshawkes.* Written about 1575. Now first
printed from the *original* ms. on vellum.
London, Quaritch, 1886. (SK 321 P43)
The introduction contains a catalog of early
English books and manuscripts, In addition
to the treatise, there is a glossary of
terms used by falconers.
- Russell, William Fletcher. Falconry; a handbook
for hunters. New York and London, Scribner's,
1940. (SK 321 R96)
The author's experiences in taming and
training a hawk,
- Salvin, Francis Henry. Falconry in the British
Isles.* London, Van horst, 1873, (SK 321 S18)
Regarded as the "best modern book in English
on the art and practice of falconry," Many
colored plates of the birds and the imple-
ments.
- Sprunt, Alexander. North American birds of prey,
New York, Harper, 1955, (QL 696 .A2 S77)
Based upon and supplementary to The
hawks of North America, by John Bfchard
May.

Stevens, Ronald. The taming of Genghis. London, Faber and Faber, 1956. (SK 321 S84)

An account of experiences with a gyrfalcon.

Tapp, Eberhard. Waldwerck und federspeil.* Strassburgh, Lander, 1542. (SK 321 T17)

This interesting collection contains chapters on how to tame, train, and dress hunting birds; also how to treat their various ailments.

Von Michaelis, H. Birds of the gauntlet. London, Hutchinson, 1952. (QL 696 .A2 V94)

About the birds the author has known in South Africa. Many excellent drawings and sketches.

Waller, Renz. Der wilde falk is mein gesell.* Neudamm, Neumann, 1937. (SK 321 W19)

A brief account of falconry as seen by an accomplished artist, whose drawings from nature are well reproduced.

White, Terence Hanbury. The goshawk. New York, Putnam, 1952. (SK 321 W58)

The author's experiences attempting to tame and train a goshawk,
